HYC Team Joins New DGHI Director on Priority Visit to Eldoret, Kenya

In January, the new Duke Global Health Institute (DGHI) Director, Dr. Chris Beyrer and a team from the HYC visited Eldoret, Kenya as part of an African priority site tour. A highlight of Dr. Beyrer's trip was to visit the Cardiovascular Diseases Center of Excellence (CV COE), a joint collaboration between Duke, Moi University, and Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital that has transformed cardiovascular care in Western Kenya.

Prior to the creation of the CV COE in 2008, there were no adult cardiologists in the region. Today, there are five consultant adult cardiologists and four CV Fellows currently in the Moi University Clinical Cardiology Fellowship Training program, which was established under the umbrella of the CV COE.

During Dr. Beyrer's visit, he met institutional leaders at Moi/MTRH with a goal towards strengthening our collaboration. Dr. Beyrer was able to tour the hospital and visit the construction site for the new Interventional Cath

Lab. He also got to meet with Kenyan and Duke trainees during a lunch-and-learn session where each trainee shared an overview of their research as well as stories about how engagement with Duke has facilitated career development and growth opportunities for each of them.

HYC Faculty Achievements

Mwanza, Tanzania: Congratulations to **Dr. Kristin Schroeder,** GHP graduate and current Duke Pediatrics faculty, for receiving funding from the **Duke Cancer Institute's Population Sciences Pilot Study program** for her project, *Development of media campaign to increase Red-reflex screening in Tanzania.* Because the pediatrics retinoblastoma survival rate is less than 30% in Tanzania, this project aims to develop and pilot a multi-component retinoblastoma awareness campaign using mixed media to increase understanding and screening, while also training health care workers to identify early symptoms and refer children for more evaluation.

Eldoret, Kenya: Dr. Neelima Navuluri, Duke Pulmonary and Critical Care faculty and GHP Graduate, received DGHI pilot grant funding to support her project, *Impact of Air Pollution on Post-Tuberculosis Lung Disease*. She is also the recipient of the Parker B Francis Fellowship for this study. Her team aims to generate data to inform interventions to reduce air pollution exposure among individuals being treated for tuberculosis who are at high risk for post-TB lung disease caused by exposure to air pollution.

Congratulations to Dr. Jerry Bloomfield on being named the **DGHI Associate Director for Research** and on being elected to the **American Society for Clinical Investigation**. Dr. Bloomfield is a GHP graduate and is currently an Associate Professor of Medicine with Tenure at Duke. His global health research interests are in the epidemiology of heart failure and cardiovascular risk factors in sub-Saharan Africa.
