GHP Graduate Delivers Remarks at Master's Degree Commencement

Dr. Prince Antwi was the student speaker for the [2024 Global Health Pathway Master of Science in Global Health degree commencement ceremony](#) in May. As he delivered his speech, he reminded his classmates that the inequities in health that they have researched have not gone away, and it's now their responsibility to use their skills to address them. Challenges only seem impossible, he said, until you confront them. "That's why today is a commencement, not a finish line," Antwi said. "I propose we take stock of the tools, values and relationships we have nurtured during our time here and begin to weave them together into effective solutions to the global health challenges of our day. Please, don't hold back your skills. As a DGH graduate, you have something to contribute."

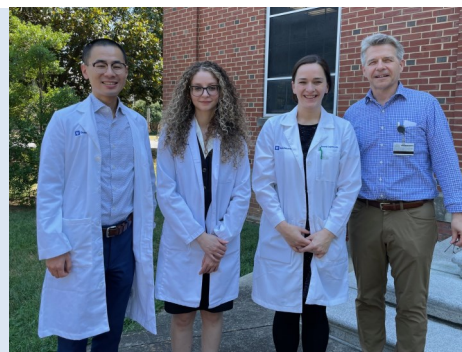
Global Health Pathway Resident Travels to Uganda

This summer, Dr. Nnaemeka Eze, GHP General Surgery Resident traveled throughout southwestern Uganda assessing the knowledge and experiences of over 100 nurses and midwives through surveys and interviews. The knowledge gained from this stage of his project will provide information for Dr. Eze and his team to design a training course that will teach Ugandan nurses and midwives to care for babies with gastroschisis and empower them with the knowledge to educate parents and the community about babies with this condition. Furthermore, the training course will teach nurses and midwives how to apply a low cost silo to newborns with gastroschisis immediately upon delivery, a measure which would help reduce bowel exposure time and in turn reduce avoidable mortality from gastroschisis.

New Trainees Prepare for HYC Clinical Elective Rotations



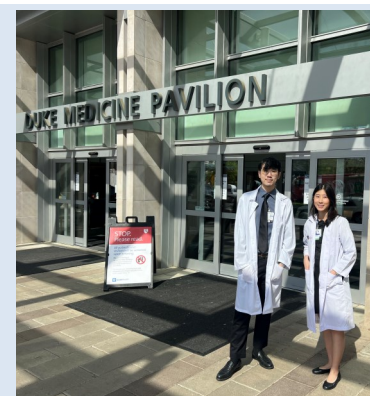
Clinical Elective Rotation trainees with Dr. Lumsden & Dr. Herfel at 1st Curriculum Night of the Year

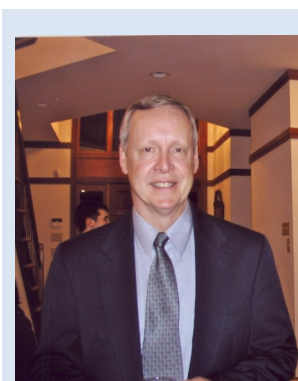
International Clinical Rotation at Duke University
